Introduction

Michael Nelson summarized the County of San Diego's Department of Parks and Recreation proposal for a \$450,000 capital improvement to a segment of the San Diego River Trail in El Monte Valley, known as the Historic Flume. He recalled that the County acquired the property and partnered with the San Diego River Conservancy (SDRC) to complete the trail segment as a priority identified by the Gaps Analysis and the Intergovernmental Working Group. He added that the SDRC had given conceptual approval to the project provided the County achieves CEQA compliance, as well as, refines cost estimates and design for the trail. He stated that the County met those obligations and as a consequence there was a resolution before the Board to allow the Executive Officer to seek a \$450,000 grant from the State Coastal Conservancy from SDRC's Prop 84 set aside.

Dianne Jacob made a motion to approve the staff recommendation for the SDRC Resolution 12-03.

Mike Nelson introduced Megan Hamilton who provided a brief description of the project. She said this segment of the Historic Flume and trail is on property the County owns, which is accessible through the El Monte County Trail and Staging Area. She said the County would be completing segment 60A and portion of 60B of the San Diego River Trail Gaps Analysis; and, added that they had completed the Initial Study and Mitigated Negative Declaration, biological / cultural surveys, and the environmental document was circulated for public review. She stated that four comments had been received and changes have been made to reflect them. She pointed out that the County had refined the trail alignment to meander and avoid some of the deeper portions of the drainages; and, that the cost estimate for the project had been reduced from \$485,000 to \$450,000.

Ruth Hayward inquired about the Valley View community trail that had been listed on the map.

Megan Hamilton responded that it was a trail that leads from the Blossom Valley Estates. She explained that when Blossom Valley Estates development was approved, it was a trail that leads from the development to El Monte. Moreover, the trail easement was adjacent to the Flume Trail that was also dedicated as part of the Blossom Valley Estates project. She testified that this access was for that community, which exists and is presently used.

Ruth Hayward asked about the blue and black hashed lines on the map identified as "proposed regional trail" She was concerned that a portion of it snakes up the face of El Capitan, which contains prime golden eagle nesting sites.

Megan Hamilton responded this map shows the big picture for possible trail connections that presently do not exist. She said any trial development that would be proposed would be analyzed in accordance with CEQA.

Andrew Poat asked for clarification.

Megan Hamilton clarified that for the regional trail only proposed alignments exists, design and refinement of the alignment has not been done. The County would follow the same approach it followed for the flume alignment for any new trail or regional trail connections it may decide to pursue. It would refine, design and engineer an alignment in accordance with CEQA.

Ruth Hayward commented the golden eagles had been disturbed at El Capitan during the construction of Sunrise Powerlink.

Ben Clay said to call for a motion, if there were no other questions.

Dianne Jacob restated the motion to approve Resolution 12-03.

Ben Clay seconded the motion.

Mike Nelson conducted a roll call vote and the motion was approved unanimously.

7. San Diego River Conservancy: 5yr Capital Outlay and Financing Plan / 2012-17 (INFORMATIONAL/ACTION)

Andrew Poat will review a proposed framework for preparing SDRC's 5yr Capital Outlay and Financing Plan / 2012-17 and facilitate a discussion with the Governing Board that will guide its development.

Presentation and Report:

Michael Nelson established the context of for Item 7 by recalling the Board's approval of the Strategic Plan Update for SDRC's 5–Year Plan at the last meeting. He said it was agreed that the first step was to update the objectives of the 5-Year Strategic Plan and the second step was to revise the Infrastructure and Financing Plan, which is the subject of Item 7. As recommended by the Chair, Ann Miller Haddad lead the completion of the Strategic Plan update and Andrew Poat was tasked to lead the development of and Financing Plan and revised 5-year Capital Outlay.

Andrew Poat presented slides that outlined the development of a financing plan and allow for the integration of a 5-Year Capital Outlay a required by the Department of Finance. His presentation focused on the following outline that identified a timeline and tasks.

Strategic and Financial Planning Overview

Strategic Plan Update

- Review existing Strategic Plan Project priorities
- Adopt new financial plan
- Strategic Plan Update adopted July, 2012

Finance Plan Development

Karen Finn asked if the Executive Officer had been in contact with a Department of Finance analyst regarding deadlines, because plans were due in August.

Michael Nelson responded that the DOF analyst has typically revised SDRC's 5-year Capital Outlay on an annual basis, since the existing Infrastructure Plan and Capital Outlay are out of date. He stated that the capital budgeting exercise and revision of SDRC's Infrastructure Plan that he and Andrew Poat are referencing will address this problem.

Andrew Poat said that the exercise the Executive Officer described is but one work product to be presented to the Board in November. Andrew returned to his outline and explained that time will required to develop Phase 2.

Phase 2:

Identify for Conservancy

- "Tool box" of funding strategies (review of funding opportunities)
- Implementation requirements (e.g. resources)
- Preferred methods to coordinate with trusted partners
- Timeline for next steps, setting goals for next calendar year

Phase 1 Finance Plan Activities:

Rob Hutsel, as Chair of San Diego River Coalition said he looked forward to partnering with SDRC and the inclusion of the Coalition in this process to improve collaboration to achieve greater success. He encouraged Andrew to get materials to its partners early so feedback can be provided.

Michael Nelson commented that SDRC isn't proposing to challenge the Coalition's priority but to focus on those where there is agreement. He further explained the SDRC develops and formalizes it Annual Work Plan to reflect the priorities the Coalition has identified in its annual planning process. He said as an example the SDRC 2012 Work Plan approved the Carlton Oaks and Fenton to I-15 segments of the San Diego River Trail, which were also identified as top priorities in the Coalition's Work Plan.

Lorie Zapf stated that she would like to clarify and simplify things because everyone has their own priorities, SDRC, Coalition, SDRPF, etc. She asked if there was a financial subcommittee that could develop cost estimates for these priorities and identify sources of funding to pay for them.

Andrew Poat responded that he was the financial subcommittee and added what was critical was the development of funding strategies for these projects. He said that he has been involved with public funded projects long enough to know that there are lots of different ways to sell the project and who can best pay for it. He said the Water Bond was a perfect example of the regional business community getting organized, going to Sacramento, and working with the delegation to make certain there was an earmark for SDRC included in the legislation.

Lorie Zapf asked that after the Board votes to spend money on priorities is there any follow up.

Michael Nelson said yes, that it was included in SDRC's Annual Work Plan and that he would to provide a matrix and pie charts that present this information.

Dianne Jacob moved for adopting the recommendations outlined. The motion was seconded by Lorie Zapf, approved unanimously.

Ben Clay said Item 8 will be moved to the end of the agenda.

9. Tributary Canyons: Feasibility Study- Preliminary Planning – Status Report (INFORMATIONAL/ACTION)

The Executive Officer and consultants for the State Coastal Conservancy (SCC) will review the status of activities authorized to provide design services, conduct preliminary real estate work, initiate environmental review, and permitting for the Tributary Canyons project as directed by *Resolution No: 10-01* of the SDRC Governing Board.

Presentation and Report: Jim King, SCC Consultant Ann Van Leer, SCC Consultant

Michael Nelson reminded the Board of SDRC's commitment to establish trails connecting the mesas in Mission Valley and Normal Heights to the river, and explained that SCC and SDRC having determined that the projects were feasible had initiated their design and begun to confront real estate issues. He introduced Jim King and Ann Van Leer, who had been hired by SCC to provide a status report for the project.

Jim King state that the project area to the north is Serra Mesa and to the south is Normal Heights. His presentation a summary of his presentation and timetable is outlined below:

PROJECT ELEMENTS

- A <u>system of public trails</u> linking upland neighborhoods to the San Diego River via canyons and designated urban walks.
- A canyon and river <u>interpretive program</u> that promotes links to the Metropolitan Transit System (MTS) trolley and bus transit system.
- Canyon development needed <u>environmental enhancement and stewardship program</u>.
- Project Length: 17,500 ft

Real Property: Contracts and Tasks

October 2010 - Land Conservation Brokerage:

- Establish and maintain land owner contacts
- Prepare acquisition plan

Design & Planning

Alignments: Sand Rock Canyon & Ellison Canyon

Though Ellison Canyon was the preferred location for the southern alignment, there are 18 private properties, environmental constraints and significant real property issues that have forced examination of alternative routes. The alternative alignment under consideration is the I-805 canyon trail. The embankment of I-805 is feasible and under review. A discussion regarding a new alignment with the Community Planning Group in Normal Heights has occurred.

CEQA review, alignment design and community consultation will continue through the winter and spring; a presentation to SDRC regarding funding and construction will be scheduled in summer 2013.

Todd Gloria complimented the Normal Heights Planning Group, but asked for more detail regarding the Ellison Canyon alignment, because he was not aware of the property issues that were overwhelming consideration of this option.

Jim King said there was a possibility of revisiting the alignment in the future, but state conservancies may only work with willing sellers, which is why he has consulted with the Normal Heights Planning Group.

Todd Gloria expressed his disappointment because he had visited the proposed alignment and found it to be phenomenal, and felt strongly that the public should have access to that canyon. He asked to be educated on the position of the two property owners.

Ann Van Leer responded that the biggest issue involves the Carmelite Monastery. The monastery is located there because it provides peace and quiet, and they have expressed that they did not want more people there that might disturb this pristine setting. She said that she had multiple conversations with representatives of the monastery, who have been gracious, but made it clear that the trail is not compatible with their use of the land, which is one of quiet prayer and contemplation. She also testified that a property owner and family were also concerned about the public tromping through this otherwise peaceful canyon.

Todd Gloria said that he appreciated their concerns, but stated that we should be cognizant of the fact that the area in question is an intersection of the City of San Diego, not East County. He stated that both of the properties mentioned sit high atop the canyon, so he questioned whether their concerns are more emotional or practical.

Ann Van Leer responded that for the monastery she felt it was "practical" but "emotional" for the other property owners; in fact some of the owners don't even go to that end of the property, since it is at the end of a long road, nonetheless, both expressed in no uncertain terms that they did not want the public on their property.

Todd Gloria asked whether an alignment was available that could avoid both properties.

Ann Van Leer responded that in was her opinion that there was not a suitable alternative that avoided the properties.

Todd Gloria said he understood, but felt that public access to this remarkable area was important; moreover, the alignment discussed along the I-805 was far less elegant, though it did provide access which is key. He mentioned that today the bike lane up Texas Street was opened to the public, which demonstrates that the City is building connectivity from the southern mesas to Mission Valley. He asked that SDRC not abandon the area and the information that was collected. He said he appreciated SDRC for maintaining communications with the monastery and the community; and hoped that someday all involved would see the need for public access to

what is an absolutely remarkable piece of urban canyon.

Lorie Zapf remarked that this was the first that she had heard of the project and asked whether the trails will be for mountain biking and hiking.

Jim King said that final design decisions have not been made and will be greatly influenced by ADA; however, the trail on the north from Serra Mesa, there was a good possibility that it could be a multipurpose trail.

Lorie Zapf stated that from the standpoint of connectivity why would anyone want to go down to Mission Valley, because once there you must get on a trolley or bike path to go somewhere; so, she wondered what the reason was for trail connections to Mission Valley.

Jim King responded the reasoning and purpose was to connect communities to the river and the proposed San Diego River Park and the San Diego River Trail, which was obviously a futuristic long range endeavor. He noted at the Qualcomm reach of the river there were more 200 acres of property in public ownership; and the City of San Diego's draft master plan for the river park, as well as the conceptual plan produced by the Park Foundation had recommended that scenarios for redeveloping Qualcomm include a park and open space. He said at earlier meetings, the SDRC board had approved connections between the communities in Mission Valley to the river to the transit station and Qualcomm.

Lorie Zapf commented that she worried that we were diverting resources to get trails down to the river before the San Diego River Trail was finished.

Ben Clay observed that Councilmember Zapf's questions about trails prompts him to raise a question about the progress the City was making to adopt its master plan for a river park, because it would demonstrate how trails from the mesa and the park fit together. He asked the executive officer if he was aware of the status of this master plan.

Michael Nelson responded that the City of San Diego had not adopted their master plan for the San Diego River Park, that to the best of his knowledge it was stalled in environmental review. He added that with the pending mayoral transition, he was concerned whether any momentum for adopting the plan would be lost; and whether SDRC could recommend that this master plan receive attention, since it has been under development for more than ten years.

Ben Clay asked whether the Councilmembers present could check on the master plan's status and what could be done to move it forward.

Todd Gloria agreed that they could seek to move it along, but emphasized that environmental review needs to be completed and is within the purview of the Developmental Services Department. He understands the concern regarding a mayoral transition, but doesn't want to release a bad document and thinks it is highly unlikely that the plan could be considered in the next 90 days.

Michal Nelson first introduced Gary Strawn who would make a brief presentation on an acquisition that he and the San Diego River Park Foundation had been working on.

Gary Strawn provided slides and a brief presentation regarding trout and ponds he had discovered near Boulder Creek. He said these ponds and the wild trout populations they hold are good biological indicators that eight years after the Cedar Fire the river is providing good habitat. He stated that the San Diego River Park Foundation had successfully placed the parcels in escrow. He said the property was located 1800 feet off Boulder Creek, four to five miles below Lake Cuyamaca and would be a great place for an upper watershed monitoring station.

Walker Properties, Santee

Michael Nelson recalled that SDRC had secured funding for the acquisition from US Fish & Wildlife Service and the State Coastal Conservancy. He said that the final \$1 million from USFWS was approved by the Wildlife Conservation Board at their meeting last week and that the next step was to schedule closing on this property that will to be conveyed to Santee.

Procurement Report

Michael Nelson said that the attachments for this Item include a list of procurements made by SDRC. He stated that at the last meeting during a discussion on the Board's previous delegation of authority to the executive officer, it was recommended that we examine the format and methodology used by the Port of San Diego for its procurements. He said the list he had attached adopted the Port's format.

Proposition 84 Projects

Michael Nelson said that with the Boards approval today of the County's Flume Trail, three San Diego River Trail projects indentified as priorities by SDRC and the jurisdictions would be funded by Prop 84 funds would be submitted to the State Coastal Conservancy for final approval.

2013 SDRC Meeting Dates

Michael Nelson provided a list of dates for SDRC's meetings in 2013 for consideration. He noted that the Governing Board Meetings have historically been held bimonthly on the first Thursday of the month. He noted that there had been one request to move the January 10, 2013 meeting to January 24. He said he hoped the Board could finalize its 2013 at the November meeting.

Ruth Hayward said that anyone who has a conflict with the January 24th date should email the Executive Officer so he can select a date that's best for most of the members. She then said the Board would return to Item 8 on the agenda.

8. Helix Water District: Potential Settlement and Sale: 500+/- riparian acres *El Capitan Golf Club, LLC v. Helix Water District (INFORMATIONAL/ACTION)*

Executive Officer will discuss possible ramifications of a settlement of this lawsuit, which involves a 500+- acre riparian leasehold traversing 3.5 miles of San Diego River northeast of Lakeside that would trigger SDRC's statutory Right of First Refusal. This discussion could include actions necessary to exercise its Right of First Refusal.

Status Report

Michael Nelson, Executive Officer

Ben Clay asked if Mike would do a public briefing on the background of where we have been.

Michael Nelson directed the Board's attention to the meeting materials that included his correspondence with the Helix Water District, a response prepared by the District's counsel, Best, Best and Krieger, and finally correspondence prepared by a Deputy Attorney General on SDRC's behalf, which addresses Helix's conclusions and disposition. The Helix letter acknowledged SDRC's Right of First Refusal, but argued that SDRC's statutory provision, as well as, the Government Code for Surplus Property could be addressed after a settlement agreement had been executed. He conveyed this correspondence to the Deputy Attorney General for analysis. Hayley Peterson recused herself because of her previous association with Best, Best, and Krieger and Rosana Miramontes from the Attorney General's, Los Angeles Office was assigned. She prepared letter and analysis of Helix's disposition but would like to present her conclusions in Closed Session. Consequently, those that desire to speak on the subject should be allowed to testify at this time before SDRC goes into a Closed Session.

Scott Smith from Best, Best & Krieger and counsel for the Helix Water District said Helix has been a SDRC's partner since its inception. He stated that recent communications between the organizations lacked some of the background, plans and thinking that Helix has done. As a consequence, he said he appreciated the chance to provide an explanation before this item is deliberated in closed session. He said that Helix has been a steward of the property, which included water rights, for more than a century and a half. A decade ago Helix thought the mission could be best served through a significant reuse of this land. Helix entered into multiple dispositions and agreements with a partner, El Capitan Golf Course, which is on the other side of the litigation.

He explained that at first the land was to be a golf course, which changed so the extraction of mineral resources to reclaim, restore the property and develop a water reuse facility with those revenues could be pursued. None of those contracts worked out for several reasons which are included in Helix's pleading. The partner has served Helix with at claim for \$100 million and a claim for inverse condemnation, which is set for trial in November. Helix decided to work with the other party to settle the dispute. At this point they have not executed an agreement. He said that the District respects and honors the SDRC's First Right of Refusal. He explained some of the settlement terms that may be of interest to SDRC: The first element of the proposed settlement would require that the \$100 million claim against Helix be released. Secondly, the mineral resources would be available to the other side for extraction and subject to a major use permit issued by the County of San Diego and the State of California, because whenever any permit is discussed for this property Helix insists that the property be available for public use in a manner consistent with the mission of SDRC.

He testified that the property was in very bad condition, that pending settlement the County and the Regional Water Quality Control Board allowed it to remain in its present condition. Clean up of the mess has been estimated between \$10 and \$30 million. All of the elements, including the \$10 million option price is part of the "balanced dinner" Helix is considering. "Dessert" would be the ultimate use of the property would be consistent with SDRC's and Helix's mission. He explained that he had been asked by the Helix Water District whether SDRC's First Right of Refusal and the rights of other sister agencies to buy surplus property would apply in this circumstance. He said with all due respect to the Deputy Attorney General's opinion, he was not sure that it would. He said that the court could take title to satisfy a judgment, and if it was taken, it was his opinion that

SDRC would not have a say about that. He added that when and if Helix had a settlement that contemplates transfer of the property, they would give to SDRC an opportunity to match that offer. He observed that terms of the settlement and the offer would address mineral resources, the ultimate title to the property, the forgiveness of the \$100 million claim, the obligation to free the property of liens, and the requirement to clean it up to the satisfaction of San Diego County and the Regional Water Quality Control Board. He stated that he wanted to make clear that he believes that SDRC has the right to match all of the terms and not to just pick and choose among them. He suggested the Board consider working with Helix and the County on the ultimate disposition of the property, because he is virtually certain that there will be no problems with mineral extraction or any use of that property provided that it is returned to its primordial state and available to public use consistent with the SDRC vision.

He concluded that if SDRC was to force the issue of its First Right of Refusal, it could result in both parties going back into litigation. He closed his remarks by stating that he hoped SDRC will continue working with Helix and the other party when they approach the County with a vision that will be less disruptive and costly to the parties involved.

Andrew Poat asked what was the nature of the clean up that would be required.

Scott Smith said that it involves several of the features of the golf course that were installed as water hazards and placement of surface materials that were left off site that could slough off and cause erosion into the river.

Dianne Jacob asked whether settlement was likely in November.

Scott Smith said stated that a trial date was on the calendar, but he said he will ask the court on Monday for more time to reach a settlement or prepare for trail. Since the parties have been negotiating, he believed the court will continue this date.

Dianne Jacob asked questioned counsel regarding why a closed session necessary could not be discussed in open session.

Jamee Patterson replied that the Bagley-Keene Act, which is the applicable conveying act, entitles State agencies to go into closed session to discuss threatened litigation both by itself and others; and, those discussions with counsel are privileged and should be conducted in closed session. She said to do so SDRC must ask members of the public to please leave the room.

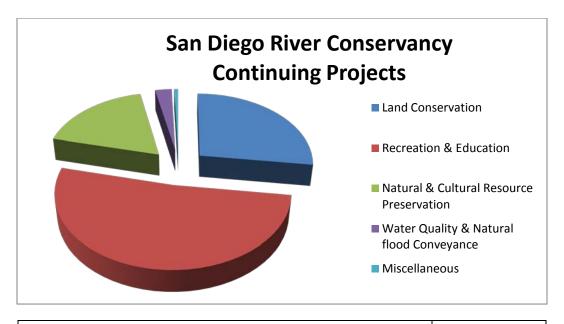
